God @ Home (4): Straight Talk About Straight Talk

I. Introduction

- A. Percy and Florence Arrowsmith once held two Guinness World Records
 - 1. The first record was for longest marriage of living couple (80 years)
 - a. The second was for the highest aggregate age of couple (205 years)
 - b. Both of them have since died, but that's a pretty impressive record
 - 1) Florence Arrowsmith left us this advice for a lasting marriage. You must never go to sleep bad friends. If you've had a quarrel, you make it up. Never be afraid to say, "I'm sorry"
 - 2) Percy said the secret to marriage is two words-"Yes, dear."
 - 2. Which reminds me of another story about the secret of marriage
 - a. Couple celebrated 50 years of marriage (rookies by comparison)
 - b. Some asked the husband what was the secret of a great marriage? *Training. She was a communications major in college; I majored in theatre arts. She communicates well, and I act like I'm listening.*
- B. We continue with God @ Home with a word or two about our words
 - 1. There's an old proverb we use if someone says something hurtful *"Sticks and stones may break my bones but words will never harm me"*
 - a. Steve Martin routine as a televangelist interviewed by a magazine
 - b. When the article was printed, he was less than pleased with it *That article was full of lies and made up facts. If I'd have known they would have printed all that, I would not have lied and made up facts*
 - 1) That old "sticks and stones" proverb is lies and made up facts!
 - 2) Proverbs assures us that words hurt (<u>11:9</u>; <u>12:6</u>; <u>12:18</u>; <u>15:4</u>)
 - 2. James has a long section in James 3 on the power of words
 - a. We stumble in many ways; we all stumble in one way (James 3:2)
 - 1) Nobody is perfect. We all sat the wrong thing at times, right?
 - 2) Or we don't say the right thing at the right time, right?
 - b. James earlier gives some good advice that should help (Jam 1:19)
 - c. God gave each of us two ears and one mouth- do the math, right?
 - 3. Let's go back to Ephesians to see Paul's straight talk on straight talk

- C. We've seen what Paul says to husbands and wives in **Ephesians 5**
 - 1. But what comes right before that? Ephesians 4 and it applies too
 - a. We're supposed to live "out with old; in with new" (Eph 4:22-24)
 - b. We're made new in attitude of our mind (point in Ladies Class)
 - 1) We don't come to Christ only to let him change our thinking
 - 2) No, we are transformed by Christ, so we change how we live
 - 2. Augustine writes of meeting an old lady friend after his conversion
 - a. Augustine once wrote, "Lord give me chastity, but not just yet"
 - 1) His former paramour ran after him, "Augustine, it is I; it is I!"
 - 2) He finally stopped and said, "Yes, madam, but it is not I"
 - b. So we are to become new people, but what exactly does that mean?
 - c. Paul will give some very specific ways we are to be transformed
 - 3. Several of the things he says here has to do with how we use words
 - a. He intends this as general; how we use our words in relationships
 - b. We'll apply this specifically to how we use our words in marriage
 - 4. The Queensberry Rules are in effect today- "No throwing elbows"

II. Straight Talk About Straight Talk in Marriage

- A. **First**, we must tell the truth, whole truth, and nothing but truth (4:25)
 - 1. Again, Paul is talking about church; don't lie because we are family
 - 2. How much more important is total honesty in marriage relationship
 - a. You never just lie; you lie TO someone and AGAINST someone
 - b. Remember Ananias and Sapphira, "You have lied to Holy Spirit"
 1) Marriaga is being and floats Paral will mate that truth (5.21)
 - 1) Marriage is being one flesh; Paul will quote that truth (<u>5:31</u>)
 - 2) To lie to one another is to destroy foundation of a relationship
 - 3. Bible says, "All liars will have place..." (Rev 21:8). Different liars
 - a. Blatant Lies: You intentionally twist the truth to suit purposes
 - 1) You say, "I didn't mean it; I was just kidding." You mean it.
 - 2) You say, "I didn't do that; it was someone else." It was you.
 - a) Trust is the coin of the realm when it comes to marriage relationship
 - b) Once that trust is lost, it is hard to get back. Always tell the truth

- b. Misleading Lie: We can't tell what's technically true to mislead
 - 1) So Lynn pesters me to go to the doctor. I go and he says— Man, you've gained a lot of weight; this is really serious. You're so fat, I'm surprised the cops haven't been called in for crowd control. For a man your age, I'm really surprised that you're in this shape.
 - 2) I don't want to tell Lynn that; there'll be culinary consequence *Doctor said that he surprised by the shape I'm in for man my age*
 - 3) Technical expression for misleading with the truth- *a lie!*
- c. White Lies: These are little, harmless lies told out of convenience
 - 1) We convince ourselves these are altruistic, to benefit others
 - 2) Most white lies really gray, lies told to protect ourselves
 - a) GEICO commercial and Honest Abe, "Does this make me look fat?"
 - b) He pauses, looks confused, unable to answer... and she gets mad.
 - 3) When I intentionally mislead my spouse, my marriage suffers
 - 4) It's best to do what Paul says earlier of maturity (Eph 4:15)

B. Second, we are to use words that build up and don't tear down (4:29)

- 1. Words can't be unwholesome (corrupting, ESV or abusive, NLT)
 - a. The word here is literally "rotting or decaying or decomposing"
 - b. Words that belittle or tear down our spouse corrupts a marriage
 - 1) Those unwholesome, corrupting words are too easy to say
 - 2) But they're impossible to take back, and they often leave scars
- 2. Paul give us this warning when dealing with outsiders (<u>Col 4:5-6</u>)
 - a. How do you make the most of an opportunity with non-Christians?
 - b. If you want to communicate grace, then we must speak graciously1) NIV "conversation" here is simply the word "logos" or word
 - 2) To make the right impression, we must carefully weigh words
 - 3) When trying to win people for Christ, loose lips sink ships
 - c. What about having a successful marriage? Watch your words.
 - 1) No, that doesn't mean walk on eggshells (can't live that way)
 - 2) It means that we need to recognize that words have power
 - 3) Note: Paul says be careful how you act, then points to words

- C. Third, the careful use of words especially applies when angry (4:31)
 - 1. The word "mad" betrays tells us something important about anger
 - a. When angry or mad, we act crazy, right? Say or do crazy things
 - b. It also lowers the inhibition center of the brain, just like alcohol
 - 1) When we're really angry, our words are not carefully chosen
 - 2) I once said to my wife, "Honey, I really didn't mean that!"
 - 3) She said, "Yes you meant it; you just don't mean it now"
 - 2. Paul here runs the gambit from just about every kind of mad there is
 - a. **Bitterness**: That is anger we hold onto and strew over (a grudge)
 - b. Rage: That is flying off the handle (later, "I didn't mean nothing"
 - c. Anger: In case we say, "I'm not any of that stuff, I'm just mad"
 - d. Brawling: The attitude where someone is always looking for fight
 - e. **Slander**: Being angry at spouse and telling others exactly why
 - f. Malice: That's the old "Revenge is a dish best served cold" idea
 - 3. Remember this line in Paul's description of love (<u>1 Cor 13:5</u>)

III. Conclusion

- A. We say, "Talk is cheap." And it can be; our walk must match our talk
 - 1. Paul reminds us that words can be anything but cheap relationship
 - a. Our words can build our spouse up and deepen the relationship
 - b. But negative, damaging words pick at the fringes of a marriage
 - c. Until it unravels. Until it falls apart. Words are powerful things
 - 2. Want a great marriage, OK, then choose your spouse very carefully
 - a. Too late for that? OK, then you must choose your words carefully
 - b. Positive, uplifting, encouraging words create atmosphere for love
- B. Our straight talk about straight talk applies to more than just marriage
 - 1. Peter says we're entrusted with God's very words (<u>1 Pet 4:11</u>)
 - 2. This is why our words must be seasoned with salt– God's words Reach with our hands, touch this city; Lord, let our mouths speak Your truth! Use our blessings to bring justice; Let us be You, revive Your church; let us be You, on this earth.
